


# Hope Brook News


Our value this term as been Service and staff have seen so many examples of children helping and serving one another around school, for example supporting each other in their learning, giving a helping hand when someone is hurt on the playground or those little acts of service that

mean so much like helping a friend zip up their coat or passing resources that are out of reach. As children have noticed acts of service around school, they have been placing glass pebbles into a dish and it hasn't taken long for the dish to overflow! A special well done must go to Joshua Leach and family, who took up the Home-School Values challenge and made a 'service snail' to record all the acts of service they shared as a family. Do keep an eye out for the next challenge which I will sending out after the holidays.

I was thrilled to have received two letters from the Minister for Schools, Mr Damien Hinds, congratulating us for our achievements in last years' national tests.

100% of our Year 1 pupils met the expected standard in the Phonics Screening Test, making us in the top 1% of all primary schools in the country.

For the Year 4 National Multiplication Checks, our average score was 24.6 out of 25 making us one of the top 200 performing schools in England.





As most of you will now have heard, I am delighted to be taking up the post of Headteacher from 3rd June. I am very excited to be involved in the next chapter of Hope Brook.

I wish all of you a very Happy Easter and look forward to seeing the children back in school ready to keep 'Growing Together with God's love to bring hope to the world' in the summer term.

# Space Evening


For our KS2 Space Evening we welcomed Mr Craig Stanton and his incredible space telescopes in to school and were lucky enough to be able to see Jupiter close up. The children were also taken on a journey through space in the Space Dome, kindly funded by the Friends of Hope Brook School.

Back in the classrooms, there were plenty more space themed activities to try, including making vegetable prints of the relative sizes of the planets in our solar system to puzzling out the weight of a fizzy drink can on different planets and working out how craters were made on the moon.

# STEM Moon Buggies

On 11th March, the Kingfishers were treated to a STEM Workshop to create moon buggies. They worked with a partner on the design of their product, giving careful consideration to the design features, such as the best type of tyre to move across the moon's surface. In addition to using their D & T skills, the children also had to put their mathematical and scientific skills to good use.

The children had fun creating their designs, especially when they raced their moon buggies in the hall.





#### **Easter Service**

Our Easter Service, in All Saints Church Longhope, was very well attended and the children did us proud as always. The children spoke about the meaning of Good Friday and Easter Sunday as well as how we can remember this when eating our Easter Eggs.

Kingfishers class firstly re-enacted the story of Easter and this was followed by Robins and Pippins singing an action song called 'God's not dead'. Woodpeckers then showed us a way that we can remember that Jesus wiped away our sins by using ink from a newspaper. Kestrels sang a very emotional song called 'Because' which reminded us of the importance of Jesus' sacrifice. Wagtails class then thought about how chocolate Easter Eggs can remind us of the importance of Easter Sunday: Jesus' tomb was a bit like the chocolate egg – with the big stone rolled against the tomb entrance, inside it must have been dark and cramped. It's as if the darkness makes it still Good Friday, the day that Jesus died. But on the first Easter day, Jesus came alive again, and burst out of the tomb. Good Friday is broken once and for all, and new life is set free. Just like when we break into the egg.

Our school vision is ' Growing together with God's love to bring hope to the world. In this story of Easter, we learn that God loved the world so much that he sent his son, Jesus to die so that his people may be saved. The resurrection of Jesus brings hope to the world. Our Easter service was finished by us all singing the rousing song 'On that first Easter'.

# **Experience** Easter

In the final week of term, every class had a special RE lesson where they learnt more about the meaning of the Easter story for Christians and were given an opportunity to reflect on their own lives and journeys.

In the garden of Gethsemane, we thought about how Christians believe Jesus stood up for what is right, even though it was difficult and challenging for him and then reflected on the courage we need to stand up for what is right in our own lives.

We then moved onto the courtyard outside the house of Caiaphas, where Jesus was tried, and heard how his disciple, Peter, denied knowing Jesus three times before hearing the cockerel crow, just as Jesus had predicted. We reflected on how disappointed Peter must have felt in himself as we gathered around a campfire and then each put a stick in the fire to represent burning away our own disappointments.

The story moved on to consider forgiveness at the crucifixion and the joy of the disciples when they learnt that Jesus had risen from death at the tomb. At this point we looked at wildflower seeds and considered how, despite looking small, brown and life less, new life will burst from them. The children then planted their seeds in Pippins Patch and will look forward to seeing them bloom later in the year.

We ended the experience with an Easter egg hunt – a joyous celebration of the festival of Easter!
